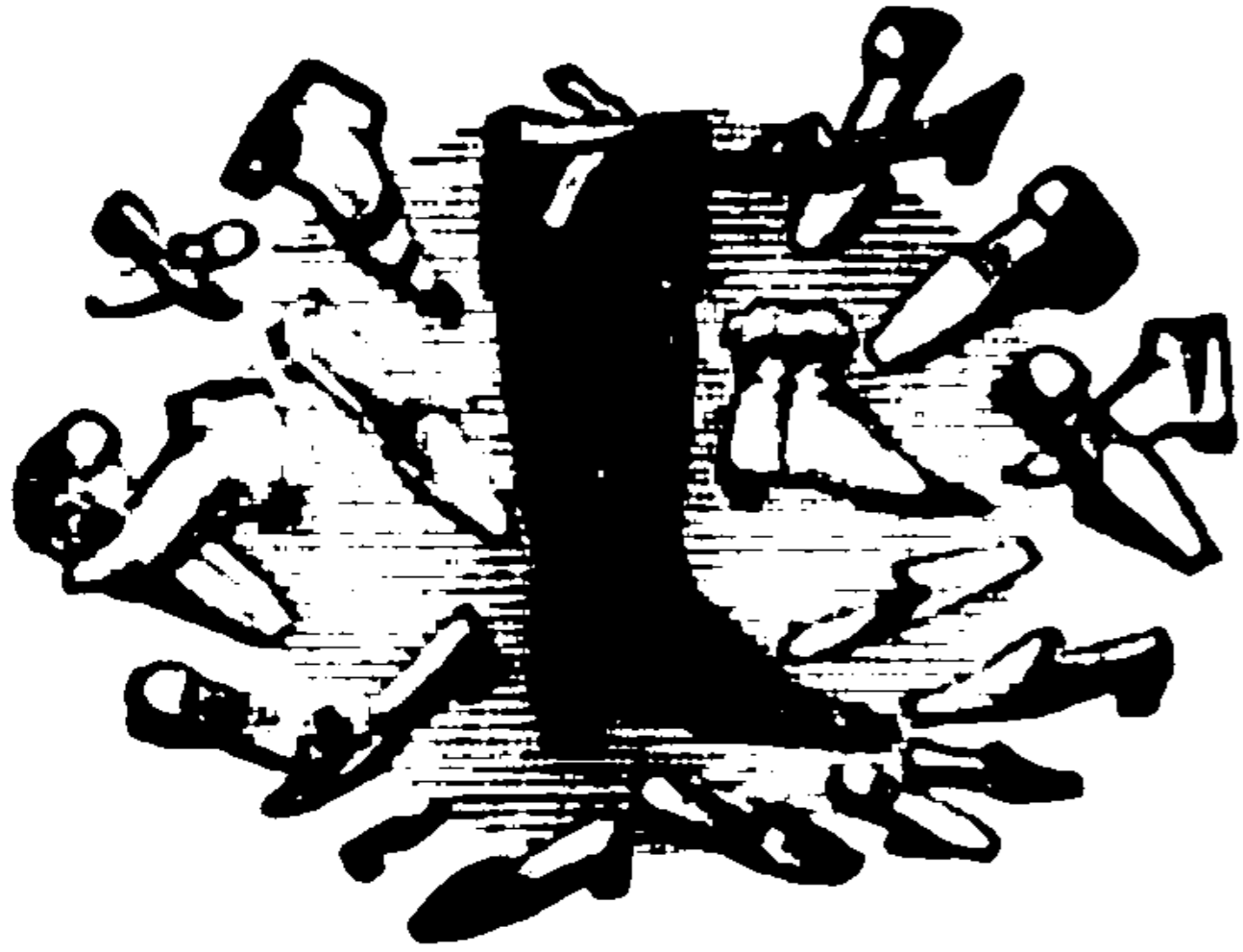

CLARKSBORO',

A post office of Scott county, in the northern part of the State, about 150 miles north of east from Nashville.

CLARKSVILLE,

A flourishing and important post city and the capital of Montgomery county, in the northern part of the State, and near the Kentucky State line, situated on the north side of the Cumberland, at the mouth of Red river, and on the Memphis, Clarksville and Louisville Railroad, 45 miles north-west from Nashville and 65 by river, fare \$2,50—200 miles north-east from Memphis and 445 by river, fare \$10,00, 185 miles from Louisville, fare \$10,00, and 300 by river, fare \$6,00. It is connected by stage

lines and distant 25 miles from Hopkinsville, Kentucky, fare \$3,00, and 35 miles from Russellville, fare \$2,50.

It was established by the North Carolina Legislature in 1795, and incorporated in 1819. It is a place of considerable commercial importance, commanding a valuable interior trade, and contains the public buildings of the county, one Catholic and six Protestant churches, several schools, a flourishing college and female academy, various benevolent institutions, two banks—the Branch Bank of Tennessee, and a Branch of the Planters' Bank, two weekly newspapers—the *Chronicle*, published on Friday, by Neblett & Grant, R. W. Thomas, editor, and the *Jeffersonian*, on Wednesday, by C. O. Faxon, editor and publisher; also numerous and varied mercantile and manufacturing establishments. Population 5,000.

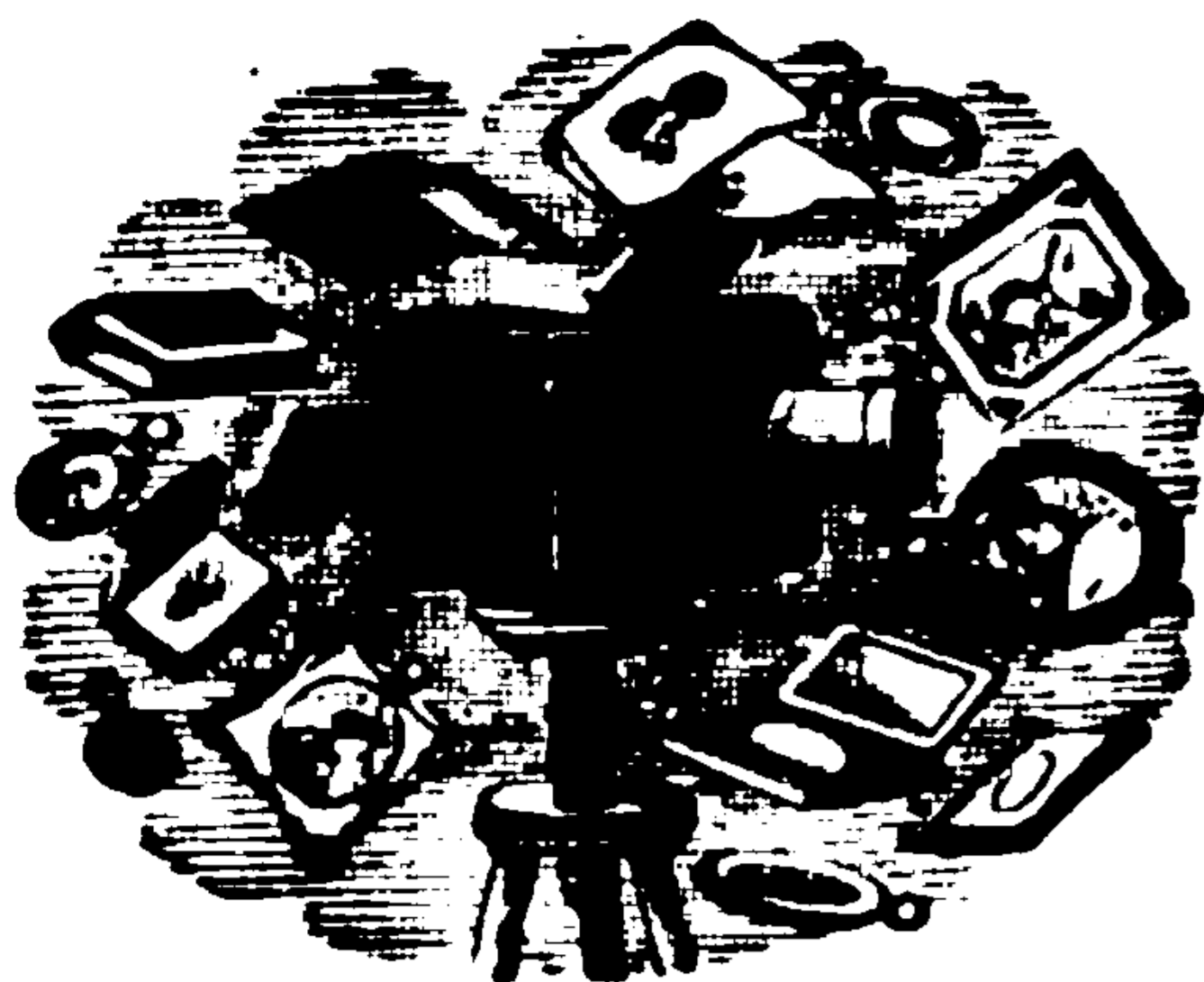

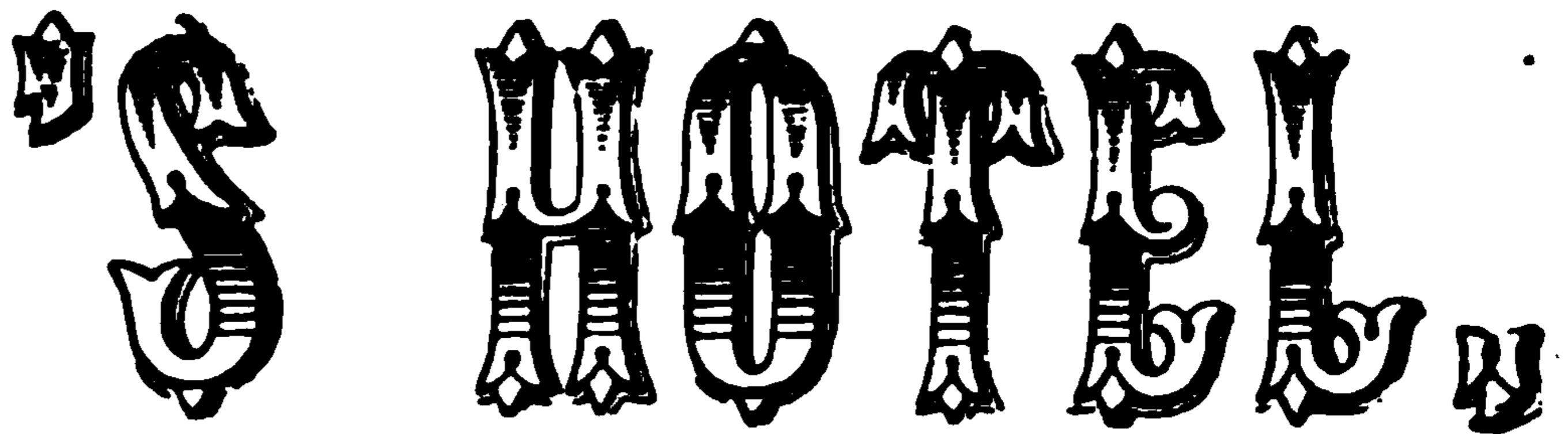

It contains a Methodist Episcopal and Christian church, and an Academy, two general stores, two flouring and two saw mills, one foundry, one carding machine, one hotel, and several mechanical trades. Post office established in 1836.
