CLARKSVILLE.

The county seat of Montgomery county, is beautifully located on a high bluff on the west bank of the Cumberland river, about a half mile above the junction of Red river with that stream. It is by river 60 miles to Nashville, and by the L. & N. and G. S. R. R. 65 miles, 199 to Memphis, and 178 to Louisville.

Clarksville was incorporated as a city in the year 1830, and has about 5,000 inhabitants. Situated as it is, in one of the most fertile counties of the State with its fine facilities for obtaining iron and coal at cheap rates of transportation, there is nothing but capital and energy required to make it a manufacturing city second to none in the State.

Clarksville is far ahead of many larger cities in religious and educational institutions, it having 11 churches of the following denominations: 1 Presbyterian, 1 Episcopal, 1 Baptist, 1 Roman Catholic, 1 Methodist, 1 Colored Presbyterian, 2 Colored Baptist, and 2 Colored Methodist. There are 5 public schools, 2 white and 3 colored, and a school built and owned by the Catholics of the city. The Southwestern Presbyterian University (formerly Stewart College) is situated in the northern part of the city. It is a fine imposing structure. This institution is under the joint control of six synods of the Presbyterian church, who have chosen Clarksville as the site for their University on account of its fine situation, healthfulness and ease of access. This institution has established a widespread reputation for its efficiency in imparting a first class collegiate education to the many who have availed themselves of the advantages it offers.

The Clarksville Female Academy, Rev. J. M. Wright, President, is located in the southern part of the city. It is a first class educational institution, and has a large number of young lady pupils from different States.

The country surrounding Clarksville is better adapted for tobacco growing than any other portion of the State. Clarksville tobacco has a reputation which has extended to foreign markets, and it is eagerly sought after by manufacturers, who are willing to pay more for it than that exported from other States. There are 9 tobacco warehouses in and around the city that handle

the product of the surrounding country, all of them doing an extensive business.

Manufactures are not as well represented here as the facilities warrant. There are 4 wagon and carriage shops, 2 saw mills, 2 planing mills, 1 foundry and machine shop, and 1 agricultural implement manufactory. The last mentioned establishment is owned by Meriwether & Patch. They manufacture a superior article of plows, cultivators, etc., and do quite an extensive business. The Clarksville Iron Wagon Co. is a joint stock company just formed. They intend to manufacture iron wagons exclusively, and employ a large number of hands. The foundry and machine shop of Whitfield, Bates & Co. is one of the oldest establishments in the city, and is doing a good business in all kinds of heavy and light machinery.

The press is well represented in Clarksville. Two good weekly papers flourish—the *Clarksville Chronicle* and *Tobacco Leaf*. They have a large circulation and a liberal advertising patronage. They are alive to the interests, and fully adequate to the wants of the county.

There are 2 hotels. The Franklin House, Bringhurst & Co., proprietors, is the favorite with the traveling public, and is a first class house.

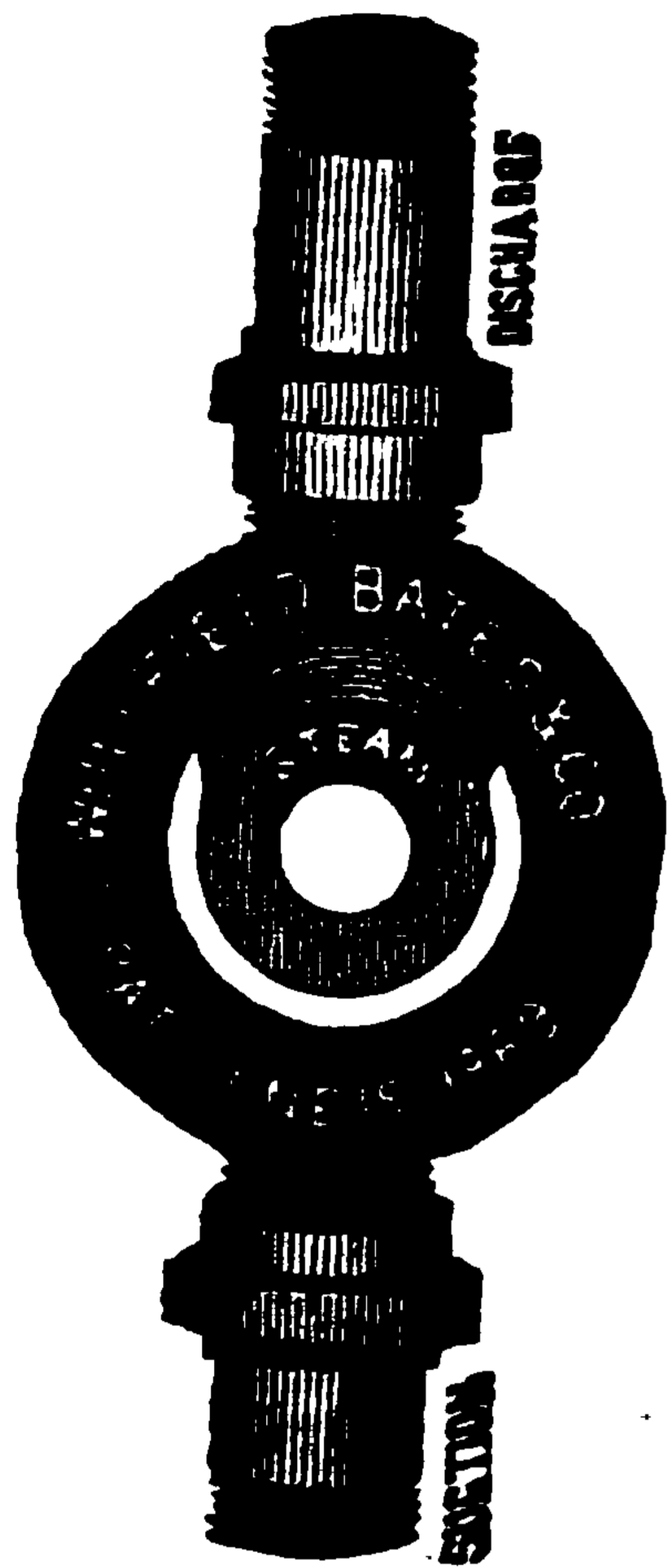
