

September 17, 2011 Meeting-- Jimmy Reedy

WCGA was pleased to have Mr. Jimmy Reedy speak at September's meeting concerning Native American involvement in the Civil War. Mr Reedy also discussed his own family history and the history of his tribe.

Mr. Reedy discussed how many Southern Native Americans who were of mixed blood owned slaves and lived like their white neighbors. Many of the traditional Native Americans did not own slaves nor did they fight in the Civil War. Those who did fight enlisted in the "Colored" regiments alongside African Americans and Hispanic Americans. Mr. Reedy also talked about his own family heritage. He discussed how he was registered with the BIA (Bureau of Indian Affairs) as having 1/8 blood quantum with the Creek Nation when in actuality he was ¹/₄ Native American overall. He talked about having a CDIB card (Certification of Indian Blood) showing proof of his heritage.

He also talked about traditional ceremonies and customs that his tribe participates in each year. One ceremony is the "Green Corn" Ceremony which takes place at the start of each new year and emphasizes forgiveness of others and a new beginning. Another ceremony is the "Stomp" Dance where members of the tribe come together for a social gathering and to dance. It was revealed how the eagle feather is viewed as sacred in Creek tradition and whenever an eagle feather fell from a member's costume during a ceremony, it had to be picked up and cleansed by an elder who was also a veteran of war.

WCGA would like to thank Mr. Jimmy Reedy for speaking at our meeting. His program was very interesting and informative and gave a more detailed perspective on Native American history and Creek culture.
