
Ellis Fults Great Grandfather of Cody Prince

Cody states his Fults lineage begins with John and Christina (Kite) Fults. They came to Warren County around 1810, as he found John on the 1812 tax list. He is descended through their son Nathan Fults (1809-1885). Nathan married Mary Crouch (supposed daughter of Richard Crouch and Charity Adams, early Warren County settlers) Nathan's obituary can be found in the Southern Standard dated May 30, 1885, page 8 under Grundy County News. See below.

We were very much pained to hear of the death of Uncle Nathan Fults, which occurred last Sunday night, at his home in Fults' Cove. He was stricken with paralysis on Friday night before his death, and was never able to speak again. Mr. Fults was about 74 years of age when he died, and was one of our best and most highly respected citizens, and we deeply feel our loss in his departure. We sympathize with his numerous relatives...

His lineage continues on through Nathan's son William Harris Fults(1841-1926), who married Lillie Ann Guest (1845-1923) (supposed daughter of William Guest and Nancy Wagner). William and Lillie had a son named Johnathan Lafayette Fults (1868-1946) who married Minnie Daisy Lynn (1884-1956), daughter of Huston Lynn and Belle Hobbs. John L. and Minnie had one son, Ellis Houston Fults (1915-2006). He married Gladys Nancy Fults (1919-2010) who are Cody's great grandparents.

Fults line as descended from Gladys Nancy Fults: Marshall Fults (1833-1876) married Nancy Campbell (1834-1903), supposed daughter of Richard Campbell and Asenatha Lamb) through their son William Prate Fults (1872-1941) and Sarah Jane Lewis (1882-1934) to their daughter Gladys Nancy Fults.


Both Fults families lived in Fults Cove, in Viola from 1810 through 1990's, and some still live there. Marshall Fults was a Quartermaster Sergeant of the Union Army in the Civil War, Company E, 1st TN Vidette Calvary.



Marriage record of Marshall Fults and Nancy Campbell







Magness Family -

Evidence has been found of a Peregrine Mackaness coming to Maryland from England in the early 1700's, wife's name Mary. His son, Peregrine Mackaness (1722-1800), wife also named Mary, maiden name unknown, traveled to North Carolina, where he eventually settled in Tryon County which was formed in 1768. This Peregrine Mackaness would eventually change his name to Perrygreen Magness. He is famous for signing the Tryon Resolves, which was a document stating the people of Tryon County would resist the British at all costs in an effort to gain independence. This document was written in 1775, a full year before the declaration of independence. Because of this, Perrygreen Magness is recognized as an early American Revolutionary. He died in the year 1800 in Warren County, KY. His son, George Magness, was a trouble maker. He spent time in debtors' prison, and even was scheduled to receive "30 lashes at the public whipping post" for some misdeed. He had a daughter out of wedlock with Mary Durham. They later wed and had a legitimate son, Perry Green Magness (1796-1884) George died in obscurity, as nothing is heard about him after the year 1800.

Perry Green Magness (1796-1884) moved with his mother to Warren County Tennessee when he was but a child. His mother had cousins, the Cantrell's, that lived in what is now DeKalb County. He grew into a very prosperous man, living in the Sink Creek area, and donating the land to build New Bildad Baptist Church, which still stands. Perry married in 1815 to Mary 'Polly' Cantrell born 1799, died 1863. His house stood in the empty field next to the church, just above the creek. At the time of his death in 1884, he had over 600 living descendants. He had many children; however we will talk about William Hall Magness and Perry Green Magness Jr.



William H. Magness Jr. became a very wealthy man as well, funding the Magness Library and Founding the Elizabeth Magness Home for the Aged and Indigent.





Phillips Family -

The earliest known ancestor is Shadrach Phillips, born 1768 in South Carolina and died 1835 in Illinois. He came to Warren County, TN with his wife Sarah Martin and children. His son, Martin Phillips (1793-1867) signed up to serve in the war of 1812 in Warren County Tennessee, under Captain James Tate. He served for a period of six months, Jan. 1814-June 1814. He married Sarah League, in Warren County on September 21, 1815 according to military records. Sarah is the daughter of Edmund League (a Revolutionary War veteran) and Mary Beadle. Their son, William Riley Phillips (1819-1875?) married Rebecca Martha Lockhart in DeKalb County. Their son, Martin Monroe Phillips married Fatima Magness and that brings us back to the Magness family.



Their son Golden Grover Phillips (1883-1963) married his second wife Dovie Sherrill (1887-

1966) in 1919.

Golden is the one to finally leave the Smithville area, having moved to Chattanooga before 1919. He eventually worked as a trolley car driver in

Chattanooga. Their daughter, Dorothy Phillips (1919-1988) went on to marry Grady Leon Prince (1915-1971). They met and married in Chattanooga, and moved back to Smithville, when Golden gave them a piece of land to live on.



Instructions for Pioneer Family application

Eligibility: The applicant must be directly descended from an ancestor who settled in Warren County prior to 1820. The applicant must be able to prove descent from the ancestor (male or female) by an official record or records for each generation, including proof for the applicant. Current Tennessee residence is not necessary.

Application: We will continue to accept applications.

Page one (1) asks for information about the applicant and the Warren County ancestor.

Page two (2) is the line of descent chart. Page three (3) is the documentation to prove your descent.

Proofs: Applications must be based on credible genealogical research such as, birth, marriage, death certificates, obituaries, census records, wills, court records, family Bible records written before 1970.

If your application is based on a previously approved application (such as a parent, sibling, grandparent, aunt, etc.) it is not necessary to resubmit documentation for overlapping generations. You need only send proof of descent for generations needed to link you to the previously approved applicant. It is still necessary to **fully complete** page (1).

Submitted Materials: All applications and documentation will be kept on file by the Warren County Genealogical Association A and used as valuable documentation material in establishing descent for descendants of early Warren County-McMinnville pioneers. Send a photocopy of pertinent materials. **Do not send original records.**

It is not necessary to resubmit documentation for overlapping generations. You need only send proof of descent for generations needed to link you to the previously approved applicant. It is still necessary to **fully complete** page (1).
