




Through this mission we hope to collect, preserve, index and make available genealogical and historical materials, especially those relating to Warren County, Tennessee and surrounding counties.

Historic Rock Island Tennessee



The Warren County Genealogical and Historical Association welcomed local author Joe Timothy Jones at our August 18 meeting. He presented a program on his book about Rock Island Tennessee.

The book entitled **The Geography & History of ROCK ISLAND TENNESSEE** is 230 pages filled with a collection of stories and pictures from Rock Island and surrounding areas.

Today's visitors to the Rock Island area, mainly Rock Island State Park and the Great Falls Lake, most likely do not know the history of the area. The sleepy little town of Rock Island was at one time the county seat of White County.

Early industry for the area was mostly lumber production. Several saw mills and grist mills popped up on all of the rivers that flowed into Rock Island. The Railroad came to this area when the line, under new ownership of Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis Railroad Co. extended the line from McMinnville to Rock

Island in 1881 and to Sparta in 1884 and eventually on to Bon Air, Tennessee. A "stop" was scheduled at the country store of Joseph Campaign where a community sprang up and later became the home for the Rocky River Coal and Lumber Company. The Caney Fork & Western Railroad now maintain and operates freight service on these tracks.

If you visit the Rock Island State Park area you will come in contact with the Fall City (Great Falls) Cotton Mill that was built in 1892. Across from the Cotton Mill is the Spring House that is the setting for many artists and special events.

The Great Falls Lake is made up of waters from the back up of Great Falls Dam. Four rivers provide water to this dam, Calf Killer, Caney Fork, Collins and Rocky River. Calf Killer is the only one that does not border the Rock Island community.

This story is a brief excerpt of the history you will find in the book.

This area is the destination to thousands of people who come to the area for fishing, camping, boating, hiking and horse-back riding. If you come to Warren County for a visit, it would be hard to find anyone who would not recommend a trip out to Rock Island, Tennessee.







Guidelines for WCGHA Surname Registry

The purpose of the WCGHA Surname Registry is to provide an index of surnames that are being researched by our members and other researchers. Our goal is to connect those who might be researching the same lines.

You may submit an entry for each surname that you are researching. Start with yourself and list your ancestor line for that surname for each generation that you have. Include the year of birth if that information is available. Example: John Berry Brown(1), John Wesley Brown b.1915(2).

If the line includes ancestors who are female, be sure you list both their maiden name and married name. Example: Zora Eva *McKnight* Mingle (b.1891)

If the WCGHA becomes aware that a person submitting entries is deceased, the address, phone number, and email will be removed and the entry flagged.

Include your name and address. If you prefer to be contacted by email, you may leave your phone number blank (or vice versa). Include the date that the information was submitted.
