A Lifetime in Harmony

This month I chose to present a story on the Harmony Echoes Quartet from McMinnville who shared their musical talents with so many of us in and around the region. The story is taken from conversations with several of the members of the quartet and a story written by Ken Stewart along with information excerpted from stories from the Southern Standard newspaper located in McMinnville.

To be blessed with talent is a gift some of us aren't willing to share with others. To have talent and gladly share it with others is certainly a gift from God and we can be thankful for those who do it.

That gift, shared so freely, blessed thousands over a 47-year period. I'm referring to the Harmony Echoes Quartet.

We claim this Southern Gospel Singing group because they formed the group right here in McMinnville, TN. Discussion began following an Oak Ridge Boys concert at Bobby Ray elementary school in 1972.

The group consisting of Kelly Marlowe, Ken Stewart, James Hillis along with Ken and Joyce Black

West began practicing a couple times a week and did their first performance at a church service at Forest Park Baptist Church in Newtown, located on the outskirts of McMinnville.

Having the gift of voice and two of the group with piano and guitar playing abilities, made it much easier to practice and build a portfolio. With few exceptions, they entertained most weekends performing at local churches, homecomings, revivals, always at no charges to the public. They ventured out usually within a 100-150 mile radius to Alabama, Kentucky and many different events in the area.

You could usually count on seeing them at the Warren County Fair, Ben Lomand and Caney Fork Co-op meetings and they often performed at the Wayside, Fairview and Midway Community Centers and was well known in the Sparta community. They sang at churches for all denominations. When they performed at the National Association of Telephone Co-ops in Nashville in 1998 they were approached to make their first recording. The album "Sing the Gospel" was produced in Nashville.

Kelly Marlowe lived in several places in Northern Alabama as a child and ended up in McMinnville where he graduated from Central High. He loved

singing at an early age and joined several singing groups while in high school.

Kelly was married to Gwen Frisby Marlowe who passed away in 2011. They were the parents of 3 children who gave them 6 grandchildren and 2 greats. Along with the loss of his wife, his son Scott passed away in 2011.

Kelly was owner and operator of Kelly's Inc. Clothing Store in McMinnville until 1987. After that he sold life insurance for Home Beneficial for 13 years and then chose to become semi-retired. He was then employed for 20 years with WBMC Radio in McMinnville and was co-host to "Town Talk" when he retired in 2020.

His contribution to the group was his baritone voice and he often sang lead. He stills gives to his community as choir director at Liberty Presbyterian Church.

Ken Stewart sang tenor and often sang lead for the group. He was also the engineer and set-up guy. This was a great asset to the group. We all know that a performance without a proper sound system can be difficult to keep a crowd's attention.

He was born in Harlan County, Kentucky and moved to Kingsport, Tennessee at the age of nine and eventually lived in Johnson City, Oak Ridge and Knoxville. He graduated from Norris High School where he sang with a group known as the Harmony Boys Quartet. He entered the U.S. Army shortly after graduation. After his military service he worked at several different jobs as a standard

engineer and in 1965 he moved to Warren County and took a job as chief engineer for Oster Corporation. He worked there until 1975 when he left and started building houses. He ventured into real estate, went to school to become a real estate broker and became owner-broker of Discovery Realty and eventually sold the company and retired.

Ken was married to Sue Rather Stewart who passed in 1999, they were parents to a daughter and grandparents to 2 grandchildren. They were active members of the Gath Baptist Church for 15 years and he was appointed as Director of Music for the Shellsford Baptist Church where they attended for several years.

He and his wife Sylvia Womack Stewart enjoy their combined families and are active members of the Gath Baptist Church.

James "Dickie" Hillis, has lived in Warren County all his life and was known for his rich bass voice to the quartet. He also started singing in high school groups and it was in one of these groups where he and Kelly became friends. He has been married for 60 years to Carolyn Townsend Hillis. They are parents to 4 children and cherish their 7 grandkids and several greats. He retired after 40 years in the banking business, having worked 36 years for City Bank & Trust and then with Union Planters until retirement.

He serves on the Board of Directors for Caney

Fork Electric and West Warren-Viola Utility Board. He and his wife are active members of the Rock Clift Church of Christ.

Last, but not least, are Ken and Joyce Black West.

Ken West was born and raised in Christian County, Kentucky and played basketball for Austin Peay in Clarksville, Tennessee. He is an accomplished piano and bass guitar player. He played piano for several years for the group and eventually left the piano playing to his wife and occasionally played the bass guitar. He was the piano player for First Baptist Church in McMinnville for over 20 years.

He met his wife, Joyce Black West, at a Speer Family concert in Hopkinsville, Kentucky. They lived in Hopkinsville for a while then moved to Clarksville, Tennessee where they lived for over 10 years.

He was employed by Trane Co. in Hopkinsville for several years while living in Clarksville. They moved to McMinnville in 1970 where he took a job as purchasing agent for DeZurick Southern. He worked there until retirement. Early in their marriage, he and Joyce managed a KFC restaurant in Clarksville for a year that was owned by the piano player for the Blackwood Brothers Quartet. That

was a challenge and one that made you appreciate the experience later in life. Before moving to McMinnville, they were members of the Erin Quartet.

Joyce Black West, a native of Jasper, Alabama, was raised with a rich history in gospel music. She studied piano at an early age and became an accomplished alto singer as well. She sang and played with a group as an opening act for a performance of the Speer Family Quartet where she impressed the Speers. They asked her to join the group and she did so after high school. She was hired as their piano player in 1955 and eventually became their alto singer. She went on the road with them for 3 years.

After moving with her husband to McMinnville she taught piano and voice to lots of students in the area. Along with being the alto singer for the Harmony Echoes, she eventually became the piano player as well.

In her 47 years with the group, she raised 3 children, is grandmother to 10 grandchildren and 1 great grandchild. She was chosen Mrs. Warren County Senior in 1997.

She is an active member of Irving College Baptist Church where she is the piano player and Ken is an active member of Gath Baptist Church.

Bulletin Committee Holds First Meeting




