SPOTLIGHT ON Elisha Pepper II, Pioneer Ancestor of Warren County

Elisha Pepper II (1777-1869) is the Pioneer Ancestor (lived in Warren County between 1807-1820) with the most descendants being approved to receive a certificate establishing that they are his descendants. At this time, there have been 20 certificates issued to his descendants.

Some unverified and sometimes disputed historical accounts of Warren County say that he was the first permanent white settler in what would become Warren County which was formed in 1807. He is said to have arrived in 1800. His name appears on the 1812 Tax List on Christian Shell's list and he is also on the 1820 Warren County Census with ten household members. He is definitely a Warren County Pioneer.

Several folktale -like legends have evolved around his life along with his wife, Margaret Morrow (1782-1831).

The unverified list of the children of Elisha Pepper II and Margaret Morrow and their spouses are:

Joseph Butcher Pepper (1807-1875) married Eleanor Gibbs (1825-1873) Elizabeth Pepper (22 Jan 1809-1 Jan 1862) married Caleb Talley ((1816-1905) Mary "Polly"Pepper (1810-?) married William Morrision (1811-1895) Janean Pepper (1813-1882) married John Talley (1814-1846) Elisha Pepper (1815-1869) Robert M. Pepper (1817-1874) Margaret P. Pepper (1822-1887) married Isham Clark Roach (1820-1907) William Cheek Smartt Pepper (1820-1899) married Cynthia Allison (1843-1912) John O. Pepper (1823-1863) married Elizabeth Gibbs (1835-1896) Aaron A. Pepper (1826-1864) married Clementine Allison (1838-1916) Ann Payne Pepper (1830-1893)

If you descend from one of the Elisha Pepper II sons or daughters, perhaps you should research your lineage. Family files and other resources are available at the WCGHS office which might help. You may discover interesting facts and some legends that will enrich your family's history. Check the website for Office Hours. Volunteers may be able to help you with your research. Pioneer Ancestor certificates specific to your family members make great unique gifts.
