Pioneer Ancestor Certificates Presented at Family Christmas Gathering

Brenda Kay Mayes Cothren was surprised when she was presented two Pioneer Ancestor Certificates. Brenda descends from two of Warren County's Pioneer Ancestors, Rev. Jesse Dodson (1752-1843) and Isham Ware (1793-1855).

Brenda is the daughter of George Mayes and Elizabeth (Martin) Mayes. The Pioneer Ancestors are ancestors of her mother. Eli Dodson and Jane "Jensie" Ware married sometime in the 1840's and are found in the 1850 Warren County Census living in the 4th District of Warren County. Eli and Jane are Brenda's 3rd great grandparents. Eli is the grandson of Rev. Jesse Dodson. Jane "Jensie" is the daughter of Isham Ware.

Both Rev. Jesse Dodson and Isham Ware are found in the 1820 Warren County Census. Along with that Census and other documents, these men have been established as Pioneers of Warren County since they lived here sometime between 1807 and 1820.

The certificates were presented to Brenda by Marie Blair, her first cousin, who did the research for the certificates. Brenda has many documents that provided evidence for establishing relationships of her direct ancestors. Brenda knew of a connection to the Dodson family, but had no idea of a connection to Isham Ware.

The presentation was a highlight of the Oscar Mayes family Christmas Eve Gathering. The Mayes family started getting together on Christmas Eve in 1945. That was the year Brenda's dad and sons in law of Oscar and Mary Pearson Mayes came home from World War II. They have continued that as a family tradition and have missed only two or three times of getting together since 1945. One or two times were due to ice storms and the other was COVID in 2020.

Congratulations to Brenda for honoring her Pioneer Ancestors by preserving records that were passed down from her mother that helped establish this relationship.
