Karen Carr stumped everyone with this melting pot from her father, Thomas Carr. He attended MTSU and worked in a foundry there while in college. The building still stands on campus today.



Barbara Bates brought these treasured photos of her grandfather, Benjamin Hugh Brandon, in his World War I uniform and her grandmother, Carrie Priscilla Watson, with her brother, Roy B. Watson.











Charlotte Hamby shared her spoon collection from the 1897 World's Fair in Chicago each featuring a different building. Charlotte's great, great uncle, Peter G. Litz, travelled by train (not with a ticket but by boxcar) and brought these back with him.




Bonnie Davis shared these books from North Side School (1975-76). The students were required to sign their name when they read the book and it was then passed to another student. Do you recognize any of the names?





Mary Oaks shared one of her most treasured possessions—a teapot from her mother, Viola Elliott Martens, along with some family stories that are part of the teapot history.








Marie Blair's grandfather, Oscar Mayes, owned a farm in Viola and kept a detailed journal of the operation including the names of the cows and pigs and how much it cost to operate the farm in the 1939 providing a glimpse into the life in those days.






Earl Blair's great grandfather, John Carlton Blair and his wife, Julie Ann. John built munition boxes for the Confederate Army and travelled from North Carolina to Warren County, TN through Rabun County, GA.



These treasured books belonged to Freda Clifton's grandmother, Mary Ethel Golden Grandey. Freda has fond memories of spending summer days with her and listening to her read poetry to her grandchildren.



Mary attended Pleasant Hill Academy located near Sparta (which is now a museum) and would often share her love of books through her readings with various groups in the community.



Bill Smallman brought this pogo stick that belonged to his father, Ernest Smallman, Sr. Bill declined to demonstrate this piece of history for the group and, although he offered, no one volunteered to take a turn on the pogo stick.





## Ollie Safley Russel's Quilt

This beauty was quilted by the "Get to Gether Club" in 1935. It is a community friendship quilt.

The ladies who participated each signed their name in a block: Birdie Safley, Leona Safley, Martha Simmons, Ola Mai Patton, Mary Green, Delma Kell, Alice Patton, Laura Mullican, Grace Young, Dicy Green, Maggie L?, and Mabel Gillete.

Ollie, Birdie and Leona were sisters. Ollie was born in Dec 13,1876 in Texas. By 1880, she was living in Warren County, where she married Thomas Larry Russell in 1902. She died in Feb. 1, 1956 in Chattanooga, TN. and is buried in Mountain View Cemetery here in Warren County. The Safley family had strong roots in Warren County. Her parents were Richard (1853-1938) and Nancy Drake (1853-1928) Safley. Her grandparents were Henderson (1817-1894) and Mildred Barnes (1816-1863) Safley. Her greatgrandparents were Jesse (1781 -1861) and Phatha Stiles (1788 -1870) Safley who migrated to Warren County from Virginia and North Carolina.



This quilt was preserved by Ollie's great grandson, David Russell, Jr. and came to us from David's widow, Mrs. Sandra Russell of Flintstone, GA. It was David's wish that the quilt be returned and preserved in Warren County.

Sometimes it is nice to be reminded that all around us are very talented people: artists, woodworkers, quilters, birders, researchers, and so many more, including writers. I thought about this when I recently processed, "What My Grandfathers Taught Me" by our own Larry Boyd.

This little book is actually a compilation of memories: mostly about Larry's Boyd grandfather, a bit about his Davis grandfather, and several pages about the occasion of the 200th Anniversary of Warren County.

It is a very personal story told by an admiring and loving grandson. His account of the Ghost Walk held during the Warren County anniversary truly makes history come


