



WARREN COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT by Bryan Denton

Bryan Denton is a retired deputy from the Warren Co. Sheriff's office. He started his career as a jailor/dispatcher in August 1981. Bryan shared the history of Warren Co. Law Enforcement, as well as some interesting facts about law enforcement in general. Modern law enforcement is based on Roman practices (due process, public order, property rights, fair trials, etc.).


The first jail was built in Warren Co. in 1808, and the first sheriff was Wm Cheek Smartt (1808-1816). The current facility was built in 1965. The McMinnville Police Department was formed in 1933. E. F. Chambers was the first, part-time Police Chief. The department was housed with the county jail until it moved to Courthouse Square in the mid-1950's. All police department positions were elected until 1941, when they became appointed positions. Currently, the largest force in Tennessee is in Memphis with 1900; Nashville has 1600, and Warren Co. has 40 of 41 positions filled.


Fun fact: In 1829, Sir Robert Peel formed the London Metropolitan Police Force, hence the term "Bobbies" given to law enforcement officers.

































Two New Early Warren County Settlers Approved as Pioneer Ancestors

Lusk Colville and Jacob Martin were added to the list of Pioneer Ancestors during the month of August and their descendants are being awarded certificates.

Michael David Pennington is receiving a certificate for his maternal 3rd great grandfather, Lusk Colville. Mr. Colville was born in 1791 and died 5 July 1865. He is buried in Liberty Cemetary in Warren County. Michael is a descendant of the Colville's daughter, Mary, born In 1843. She married William Harrison Stubblefield in 1863 in Warren County.

Lusk Colville claimed land in Warren County in 1819 according to the TN Early Land Registers and he also appears on the 1820 Warren County Census. Lusk Colville, age 59 and wife, Manerva, age 39 appear on the 1850 Warren County Census with their daughters, Susan, 18, Mary, 5, Amanda C, 3 and Catherine, age 1.

Congratulations to Michael for documenting his descent and recognizing his Warren County Pioneer Ancestor.

Lucas Holt is receiving a certificate for his maternal 5th great grandfather, Jacob Martin. Jacob was born in 1772 in North Carolina and died in 1860 in Warren County. Jacob Martin is the Smyrna Cemetary in Warren County along with his wife, Catherine Myers. Jacob was in the area now known as Warren County as he appears on an 1805 Tax List before Warrant County Was actually established. Mr. Martin also appears as a Locator on an 1811 Land Register for Warren County and also on the 1820 Census for Warren County.

Lucas descends from Jacob and Catherine Martin's daughter, Letty. Letty was married to David Argo, who passed way by 1848 and she and her children John, 12, Catherine, 7 and Theodore, 5, are in the home with her parents in the 1850 Census for Warren County.

Congratulations to Lucas for researching Jacob Martin and Jacob's family in order to prove he was a very early settler and his ancestor.

One of those is Under the Lake, which is also the title of several fictional mysteries written over the years. I was intrigued by the title on the spine and just had to see what it was all about.

Under the Lake – Historic Images, Stories and Genealogy of Life Along the Caney Fork River Before the Center Hill Lake. In DeKalb, Putnam, Warren and White Counties of Tennessee – was authored by Carol Denson Williams, Judy Taylor Fuson and Rita Baker and was published in 2016. It is dedicated to Thomas Gray "Tommy" Webb, DeKalb County Historian. Our copy was donated to the WCGHA in memory of Ladye Jane Hunter.

Under the Lake is divided into several sections:

The History of the Caney Fork River Building the Center Hill Dam The Families of the Caney.

This book is remarkable for many reasons. It contains 304 pages of colorful maps, hundreds of photographs. Informative text, and a detailed index. It presents as a beautiful "coffee table" book, but is so much more. It is one of those books that I can't imagine the effort that it took to compile. September 7, 1940: Germany began the Blitz, bombing London for 57 consecutive nights.


September 8, 2022: Queen Elizabeth II, the longest-reigning monarch in British history, died at age 96.
