


FOURTH COURTHOUSE CORNERSTONE 1897-









The Bookshelf

In keeping with our upcoming focus on the American Revolution, I wanted to let our readers know about some reference books that we have in the WCGHA Resource Library. These are books of names, which certainly do not read like novels. They are, however, so necessary in researching our soldiers who fought in the Revolution.

The four books are:

- 1. Some Tennessee Heroes of the Revolution by Zella Armstrong. These records were compiled from Pension Lists of 1806, 1818, 1832 and 1840.
- 2. The Pension Lists of 1792-1795 compiled by Murtie June Clark, was published by 1961. It also contains other Revolutionary War Pension records.
- 3. Tennessee Soldiers in the Revolution by Penelope Johnson Allen. This is a roster of soldiers who lived during the Revolutionary War in the counties of Washington and Sullivan.
- 4. Twenty-Four Hundred Tennessee Pensioners [in the] Revolution and War of 1812. This list is compiled by Zella Armstrong.



THIS DAY IN DECEMBER....

December 1, 1919: Lady Nancy Astor became the first woman in the British House of Commons.

November 2, 1804: Napoleon Bonaparte was crowned Emperor of France by Pope Pius VII in Paris.

December 7, 1787: Delaware became the first state to adopt the new constitution of the United States.

December 10, 1948: The United Nations General Assembly adopted and proclaimed the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

December 11, 1901: The first transatlantic radio signal was transmitted by Guglielmo Marconi from Cornwall, England to St. John's, Newfoundland.

December 14, 1799: George Washington died at Mount Vernon.

December 19, 1792: Benjamin Franklin first published *Poor Richard's Almanac* containing weather predictions, humor, proverbs and epigrams, eventually selling nearly 10,000 copies per year.

December 2, 1993: During the American Revolution, George Washington took 2,400 of his men across the Delaware River. He then conducted a surprise raid on 1,500 British-Hessians (German mercenaries) at Trenton, NJ, forcing a surrender after an hour with almost 1,000 Hessians being taken prisoner.

Another Successful Year for Pioneer Ancestors

Thank you and congratulations to everyone who received a Pioneer Ancestor Certificate during 2025. You helped us surpass our goal of getting to Certificate # 200 by December 31, 2025. We will be awarding Certificate #208 at our Christmas get together on December 6. Thirty one certificates will have been awarded this year after our December presentations.

Several new Pioneers were added to our documented list of Pioneer Ancestors. A complete list of these early settlers who have been documented as owning land or living in Warren County during the time frame 1807 to 1820 is on our WCGHA webpage. The list contains 82 men and 7 women.

Our goal for 2026 is to reach Certificate #250 as part of the celebration of the 250 th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence—America's Semi-quincentennial.

To reach that goal, we will need 42 certificates to be awarded. It seems several people have researched their family member and given gifts to other family members this year. What a great way to help your family learn family history and celebrate their part in growing Warren County, Tennessee and ultimately the United States. Many of these early ancestors left Warren County and migrated to other states as they were forming. Some received land by homesteading. Those people contributed to the growth and development of communities far away from Warren County. You may discover other family members you never knew through this research process.

In January, we hope to provide a schedule of dates during each month that someone will be available at the WCGHA office to provide assistance to people who want to research their family and have not quite figured out how to do it or may not realize the many resources in our research library.

Special thanks to the Pioneer Ancestor Committee members Ann Brown, Freda Clifton, Bonita Mangrum and Bettye Pack. They are a valuable resource in helping find documents needed to establish relationships and more than willing to help others.

Please consider helping us establish more early settlers and the ways they connect to your own family history.

PIONEER FAMILY CERTIFICATES





Bonita Mangrum received certificates as Christmas gifts for two family members. Names of the recipients and the Pioneer Ancestor are a "secret" until after the gifts are given. The pioneer is a Revolutionary War veteran. Ann Brown received certificates for herself and two biological half brothers for their ancestor, John Martin who was in the 1820 Warren County Census. Ann was able to document the half sibling relationship through DNA. She has had contact with one of these men who lives in California. Ann's research to document the line of descent back to their 4th great grandfather will be a surprise, and added to family history.
